

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME

National Service Scheme (NSS) was launched during 1969, the birth centenary year of Mahatma Gandhi, in 37 universities involving 40000 students. NSS is an extension dimension to the higher education system to orient the student youth to community service while they are studying in educational institutions. It is being implemented by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, Government of India.

Aims and objectives of NSS

1. To understand the community in which they work;
2. To understand themselves in relation to their community;
3. To identify the needs and problems of the community and involve them in problem solving process.
4. To develop among themselves a sense of social and civic responsibility;
5. To utilise their knowledge in finding practical solution to individual and community problems;
6. To develop competence required for group-living and sharing of responsibilities;
7. To gain skills in mobilising community participation;
8. To acquire leadership qualities and democratic attitude;
9. To develop capacity to meet emergencies and natural disasters; and
10. To practice national integration and social harmony

Motto of NSS

The Motto of NSS "Not Me but You" reflects the essence of democratic living and upholds the need for self-less service. NSS helps the student's development & appreciation to other person's point of view and also show consideration towards other living beings. The philosophy of the NSS is a good doctrine in this motto, which underlines on the belief that the welfare of an individual is ultimately dependent on the welfare of the society as a whole and therefore, the NSS volunteers shall strive for the well-being of the society.

NSS Symbol



- The NSS symbol is based on the "Rath" wheel of the Konark Sun Temple situated in Odisha.
- The navy blue colour indicates the cosmos of which the NSS is a tiny part, ready to contribute its share for the welfare of the mankind.
- The Red colour in the badge indicates that the NSS volunteers are full of blood i.e. lively, active, energetic and full of high spirit.
- The giant wheels of the Sun Temple portray the cycle of creation, preservation and release, and signify the movement in life across time and space.

NSS Badge:

The NSS logo is embossed on the badge of NSS. The eight bars in the wheel of NSS logo represent the 24 hours of a day. The red colour indicates that the volunteer is full of young blood that is lively, active, energetic and full of high spirit. The navy blue colour indicates the cosmos of which the NSS is tiny part, ready to contribute its share for the welfare of the mankind.

NSS was formally launched on 24th September, 1969, the birth centenary year of the father of the Nation. Therefore, 24 September is celebrated every year as NSS Day with appropriate programmes and activities

Enrolment in NSS

NSS is a voluntary scheme. NSS scheme starts from 11th Standard onwards. At college level the NSS volunteers will be enrolled from the first and second year degree-class students. The students from foreign countries studying in Indian universities can also join NSS so that they may share the experiences of national reconstruction and community work. NCC cadets will not be allowed to join NSS. Similarly NSS volunteers will not participate in NCC or any other youth organisation as long as they are in NSS.

An NSS volunteer needs to devote a total of 240 hours social service in two years duration. Every year, a NSS volunteer has to devote 20 hrs. of orientation and 100 hrs. of community service.

To enrol as NSS volunteer, contact the NSS Programme Officer of your school / college. Enrolment in NSS is free.

The NSS volunteers on successful completion of the required hours of service are issued a certificate. NSS volunteers can get some weightage during admissions in higher studies and other benefits as decided by the institutions/university.

Themes of the programme

In the past the themes of the Special Camping Programmes have been 'Youth against Famine', 'Youth against Dirt and Disease', 'Youth for Rural Reconstruction', 'Youth for Eco-Development', 'Youth for Mass Literacy', 'Youth for National Integration & Social Harmony', 'Youth for Sustainable Development with special focus on Watershed Management and Wasteland Development', 'Healthy Youth for Healthy India' and now "Youth for Cleanliness".

Regular Activities

NSS volunteers generally work in villages, slums to complete 120 hours of regular activities during an academic year. As per the fundamental principles of National Service Scheme, a volunteer is expected to remain in constant touch with the community. Hence, it is of vital importance that a particular village/slum is selected for implementation of NSS programmes. As the NSS volunteer is to live with the members of the community during the 7 days Special Camping Programme and learn from their experience during his/her tenure in NSS, the village/slum should be carefully selected for adoption by NSS unit.

120 hours per year and 240 hours for 2 consecutive year

Special Camping Programme

Special Camping forms an integral part of National Service Scheme. It has special appeal to the youth as it provides unique opportunities to the students for group living, collective experience sharing and constant interaction with community.

Special camps are organized generally on various developmental issues of national importance. In the past the themes of the Special Camping Programmes have been 'Youth against Famine', 'Youth against Dirt and Disease', 'Youth for Rural Reconstruction', 'Youth for Eco-Development' and 'Youth for Mass Literacy', 'Youth for National Integration & Social Harmony'. 'Youth for Sustainable Development with special focus on Watershed Management and Wasteland Development. Every year 50 percent of the volunteers of each NSS unit are expected to participate in special camps which is of seven days duration.

Duties of NSS Volunteers

First and Second year students have to be enrolled as NSS Volunteers. NSS volunteer should put in,

- Establish rapport with the people in the project area
- Identify needs, problems and resources of the community
- Plan program and carry out the plan.
- Relate learning experience towards finding solutions to the problem identified, and
- Record the activities in work diary systematically and assess the progress periodically and effect changes as and when needed.

List of activities during Regular as well as Special Camping

The aim of the Regular and special Camping programme is to bring youth face to face with the community and make efforts to improve their life. The NSS volunteers are to devote about 80 hours in Regular Activities for the development of the adopted village. Special

Camping has been conceived as an opportunity to live with that community for 7 days, and experience the conditions and problems of the people. The NSS volunteers need to be inspired to take initiatives for the improvement of their condition. Although the focus of the Special Camps change periodically and regular programmes are organized in response to the community needs at the micro-level, some broad areas of activities are enumerated below:-

- Plantation of trees, their preservation and upkeep.
- Construction & maintenance of village streets, drains, etc. so as to keep the environment clean;
- Cleaning of village ponds and wells;
- Environmental sanitation and disposal of garbage & composting;
- Programme of mass immunization;
- Provision of safe and clean drinking water;
- Integrated child development programmes;
- Programmes of educating people and making them aware of women's rights both constitutional and legal;
- Creating consciousness among women that they too contributed to economic and social well-being of the community;
- Work with the organisations of child welfare;
- Organizing blood donation, eye pledge programmes;
- Work in welfare organisations of women;
- Legal literacy, consumer awareness.

- Digital awareness,
- Voter awareness.

RED RIBBON CLUB



Red Ribbon Club is a movement started by the Government of India in schools and colleges through which, students will spread awareness over HIV / AIDS. It envisages instilling charity mind among all the students to extend their able help towards developing healthy life styles, donating blood to all the needy by promotion of Regular voluntary blood donation.

Red Ribbon Club Guidelines

The significance of Red Ribbon in HIV / AIDS is:

Red like Love, as a symbol of passion and tolerance for those affected.

- Red like Blood, representing the pain caused by many people who have of AIDS.
- Red like the anger about the helplessness about which we are facing for a disease for which there is still no cure.
- Red is a sign of warning not to carelessly ignore one of the biggest problems of our time.

Red Ribbon Symbol

The red ribbon is a symbol for both drug prevention and for the fight against AIDS. The Red Ribbon foundation is an organization founded in 1993 whose main purpose is the education about prevention of the Human Immunodeficiency Virus or HIV, Acquired Deficiency Syndrome Related Complex, ARC and AIDS.

The Red Ribbon is the international symbol of HIV and AIDS awareness. It stands for:

- **Care and Concern**

It is being worn by increasing numbers of people around the world to demonstrate their care and concern about HIV and AIDS - for those who are living with HIV, for those who are ill, for those who have died and for those who care for and support those directly affected.

- **Hope**

The Red Ribbon is intended to be a symbol of hope - that the search for a vaccine and cure to halt the suffering is successful and the quality of life improves for those living with the virus.

- **Support**

The Red Ribbon offers symbolic support for those living with HIV, for the continuing education of those not infected, for maximum efforts to find effective treatments, cures or vaccines, and for those who have lost friends, family members or loved ones to AIDS. But the Red Ribbons are not enough. The Red Ribbon is only a useful symbol in the long run when attached to words and deeds that actually make a difference.

If you are offered a Red Ribbon, you are asked to take it and wear it as a tribute to the millions of people living with or affected by HIV and AIDS worldwide. Anyone can wear a Red Ribbon to support the cause.

Objectives of the Club:

- To reduce HIV infection among young people by raising their risk perception through Life Skills Education programme and create awareness on Sex, Sexuality, HIV – AIDS.
- To encourage among youth the spirit to help and support people living with HIV-AIDS, thereby reducing stigma and discrimination against them.
- To motivate youth and build their capacity as peer educators by developing their skills on leadership and team building.
- To promote voluntary non-remunerated blood donation among youth.

Basis Strategies of Red Ribbon Club Programme

The programme is being implemented through Non Governmental Organisation in coordination with Universities trained RRC Incharge / Programme Officers (Lecturers) and peer educators. Non Governmental Organisation will train the nodal teachers and peer educators with

initial support from trained resource persons. The nodal teachers and peer educators will take interactive classroom sessions with students across all targeted colleges.

These sessions will be based on five issues those are as follow:

- Healthy Life Style and Stress & Strain free Environment.
- Drug Addiction.
- Blood Donation Promotion.
- Life skill Development and good eating habits.
- Reproductive & Sexual Health including RTI/STI and HIV/AIDS.

The sessions will be participatory and seek to address the concerns of youths on growing up through role-play, brainstorming and discussion. They will also address myths and misconceptions that young people have about health and reply to queries of youths by using the Question Box.

ENVIRONMENT CLUB

STARTING AND RUNNING AN ENVIRONMENT CLUB

An Environment Club is beneficial to a college for many reasons but it will never reach its full potential if only one or two members of staff and a few children are involved.

An ECO club will help to promote, monitor and operate the environment activities of the college but the whole college community need to be involved in some capacity and more students and staff need to be encouraged to be involved in the programmes operated and monitored by the club. The entire college community needs to fully understand the true importance and value of the club and the programmes they develop and run. All too often environment clubs in colleges are seen as a token gestureallowing a college to say they have such a club and that the college cares about the environment. The true importance and benefit from having such a club is lost.

The college environment club should be seen as the driving force behind all environmental and sustainable activities at the college. Organising, Publicizing, Promoting, Monitoring all environmental / sustainability events, activities and programmes. The students should be the driving force behind the eco club not the staff. An ECO club is very important as it establishes a focal point for all environmental/sustainability activities and programmes in the college and creating a sustainable campus in keeping with the principals of the government's ESDGC, ESD, SDE programme.

Teachers, staff and parents need to be encouraged to become actively involved in the clubs activities. One person, one teacher cannot cover all the potential activities of the Eco Club.

It should be the responsibility of the club to devise, run and monitor college wide activities such as the reducing, reusing and recycling programmes, energy saving schemes, promotional events. The students should report the outcome and/or findings of the programmes / activities to the staff and senior management.

It is my experience that sometimes people young and old are concerned over making a long term commitment to the club. My view is to explain that they can become involved whenever they can or for specific events, programmes and activities.

There are a number of important reasons for having a strong Environment Club.

- The club should be run in the same style as an adult club and run with a business like attitude. This will give students the opportunity to develop a number a personal and business skills.
- The club can be a monitoring group for ALL of the colleges environmental / sustainability activities. (Monitoring and developing reports, planning and implementing activities; assisting staff in monitoring related programmes and holding regular meetings. This will take a great deal of the day to day pressure for running these activities off the staff of the college.)

- It is a wonderful way for the young people to develop a sense of ownership, college pride, adding to the community spirit.
- It gives students a real sense of responsibility for their place of learning.
- It helps students develop their personal skills such as communication (verbal and written), as they will have to write and present reports. They will have to work with a number of adults such as parents and staff as well as people from outside organisations. Through these activities they will become more articulate, more confident, more creative and develop a sense of purpose as they are able to develop their ideas into practical activities for the club and the college.

It must be remembered that some of their activities may not work but this should in no way diminish from the aims and objectives of the club. If an activity does not work it should not weaken the aims and direction of the environmental aspect of the college community. It is my experience that if everyone is patient and if the activities are well thought through then most if not all the activities will succeed.

RUNNING AN ENVIRONMENT CLUB

1. First call a meeting for anyone interested in forming the club. This may include students, staff and parents.
2. Find a member of staff to be the link person to the other members of staff and administration. This person should not become responsible for the activities and running of the club, they should just be there for safety, and to assist the pupils. If the staff members become the focal point of the club then the club is not working correctly. They just assist the club run smoothly.
3. Have a room that is designated as the environment club room (whether it be a classroom or a utility room) It is important that the club feels that it has a base. This gives everyone the feeling that the environment club is well respected by all at the college.
4. Make posters to advertise the first meeting and get permission to place the posters in a number of prominent sites throughout the college.
5. Find other ways to advertise the first meeting with students, staff and parents. Maybe announce it at an all college assembly, write an article for the college magazine / newspaper.
6. At the first meeting comes up with a name for the club that will give everyone an understanding of the type of club and give the club a clear identity.
7. Design a logo (and possibly a motto/tag line) that can be used on all club documents, posters and any other publicity. THE LOGO CAN BE USED ON LETTER HEADED PAPER AND CAN BE USED TO MAKE REMINDER STICKERS TO BE PLACED ALONGSIDE ALL LIGHT SWITCHES WITH A MESSAGE TO REMIND PEOPLE TO TURN OFF ALL LIGHTS WHEN THEY ARE NOT NEEDED. THE LOGO CAN ALSO BE USED TO CREATE STICKERS TO REMIND PEOPLE TO TURN OFF APPLIANCES WHEN NOT IN USE. The logo will act to solidify all environmental activities under one umbrella organisation and assist in giving the club a clear identity.
8. Write a mission statement outlining the aims and objectives of the club. (Remember a copy of this statement and all other written documentation needs to be presented to the Head Teacher)
9. Set up an agenda for the first meeting (It may be necessary for someone to explain to the students how meetings are run especially if this is the first time that the young people have been part of such a club) The agenda should include electing such people as: Club

chairperson and a deputy chairperson, secretary, possibly a press officer and treasurer. It may be necessary to explain to the students the responsibilities of the people needed to run a club.

10. At the first meeting it will be necessary to fix a regular meeting time for the club; however some of the responsibilities for the activities may take place throughout the week.
11. Remember to share the responsibilities for the activities such as: one group to be the energy savers; monitoring the energy use at the college, another group to be responsible for recycling, another for composting etc...
12. At the first group of meetings develop a list of what the group would like to see happen. The list should be split into 2. One for short term activities and the second list will be for long term activities. These lists should include aims and objectives of their ideas and how they will to achieve the aims and objectives. The lists may be split into ideas for college and the local community as well as national and global ideas.
13. Look at the possibility of joining outside organisations that could help the group to reach its aims and objectives.
14. For those involved with the environment club to understand how through the workings of the club they are using important skills taught in the classroom.

COLLEGE ENVIRONMENT CLUB LOGO

By having a professional looking logo on all posters, signs, and messages it will show that all activities are linked to an overall sustainability programme at the college, and will act as an repetitive reminder of how seriously the college takes the issues and show a uniformed approach to all related activities.

SHORT TERM ACTIVITIES FOR THE ENVIRONMENT CLUB

(The following is a suggested list; the members of the club will have their own ideas)

- A. Have a notice board specifically designated for the club. Split the board into 2 sections. One half giving information on local community, national and global environmental events, activities and news. The other half giving information on college only activities and events.
- B. Start a college wide clean up/reducing/recycling scheme. This should include promotion of the activities through assemblies and poster/leaflet campaigns.
- C. Arrange visits to the college by outside organisations to give workshops, talks and other activities for the club and where necessary the whole college. (Such as college assemblies) Groups like RSPB, WWF (UK), Wildlife Trust and many other groups have local branches and educational officers who will visit your college for free.
- D. Develop ways to raise funds for either the group (possibly to purchase any relevant materials that the club needs) or to be used to sponsor relevant activities such as sponsoring acres of rainforest.
- E. Implement animal, insect, flower and plant monitoring programmes for the college grounds.
- F. Run a poster design competition with those taking part having their posters displayed at an exhibition at the college to be attended by not only pupils and staff but also parents and invited guests. (This may be run through Art Department.)

- G. Design an energy cartoon type character that can be used for any reminder posters and stickers such as turning off lights and computers when not in use.
- H. Develop a programme to plant rare British flowers and plants at the college. (There is an organisation called Landlife based in Liverpool who can provide these flowers and plants at cost.)
- I. Make crafts from recycled materials. These items could be used by the college and/or sold to raise funds.
- J. Set up an energy patrol that will patrol the college during break, lunchtime and after college making sure lights and appliances are off and to monitor wastage of heating.
- K. Write articles for the college newspaper and possibly local papers and magazines.
- L. Develop a number of the reduce, reuse, recycling programmes that are mentioned in other areas of this report.

LONG TERM ACTIVITIES FOR THE ENVIRONMENT CLUB.

- A. Set up fundraising events that will raise money for relevant activities and programmes while at the same time develop the ongoing profile of the Environment Club at the college. These fund raising events may include developing a working relationship with members of the local business community.
- B. Develop a College Environment/Sustainability policy with the head teacher, governors, parents other pupils and staff.
- C. Start an environment club newsletter. This can be organised through the colleges English and IT classes. Or the club can have a page or two in the normal college newspaper.
- D. Develop a safe routes to college initiative (possibly with the local authority)
- E. Develop and implement ideas to improve all environmental/sustainability activities and sites on the college campus.
- F. Set up an eco friendly tuck shop or similar, selling only fair-trade products, with the profits going to the clubs projects.
- G. Look into ways of introducing and monitoring renewable energy into the college. Solar power panels and/or wind turbines need to be strictly monitored and the energy provided worked out. This will enable the college to establish how much money is saved on the college's energy bill.
- H. Work at developing sponsorship and support from local industry/companies.
- I. Development of a college website dedicated to the environment and sustainability.

ANNUAL ENVIRONMENT / SUSTAINABILITY DAY

It would be very beneficial if the Environment Committee could arrange an annual environment day where the college would have a focused day of activities and events. (In some colleges I have visited they have arranged for an environment/sustainability week.)

Regular Activities:

- All teachers to agree that on the day all their classes would have an Environmental / Sustainability theme.
- Organisations including the colleges clubs who have an environmental, cultural and social theme would be booked to have displays promoting their aims and activities.
- Run a series of special competitions during break and lunchtime. Invite outside guest speakers to talk to the college community. (If possible include staff and parents)

- Invite the local recycling and environmental departments of your local authority to take part with displays and activities.
- Have a Question Time style event for a selected group of pupils and staff. Where a panel made up of teachers, administrators and invited guests from outside organisations and agencies (including industry) answer pupils questions regarding a variety of important environmental issues.
- Request permission for the day to be a green day with everyone having to wear something green.
- Organise an entertaining parents family and friends night to educate them and the local community on how they can help to make a difference and become more sustainable. This can also be used as a fund raiser.
